People often ask me why I am a priest? And is your family religious? My response is that I grew up in a family where faith was important, and my parents and grandparents gave good example of prayer and concern for the poor, who were always welcome in our home. The priests were vibrant and lovely people, so I had a very positive example of priesthood. I was involved in the Junior Legion of Mary which prayed each week at the meeting, and we were given apostolic work to do, visiting the sick or lonely, helping in the parish or community. When I came to leave school, I wanted to do something for God and people, so applied to begin formation as a priest.


Today's scriptures John the Baptist points to Jesus as the Lamb of God, his followers become followers of Jesus and they invite others to join them in discipleship. They 'come', 'see' and 'hear' and stayed with Jesus. We often need to have someone show us the way to Jesus, to invite us to come to him and introduce us to him and his teaching. Human interaction and witness are very powerful. In the first reading Samuel has Eli with wisdom who realizes it is the Lord calling him.

Today let us reflect on who brought us to the Lord and give thanks for their example and faith. Let us also consider who we might bring to Jesus and consider how our lives are a witness to our Christian faith. As a priest people often, even in social situations, they want to have a faith or belief conversation and probe me with questions about the church or Christian life. Let us all be open to the opportunities God gives us to speak words of encouragement and faith.

First Reading

1 Samuel 3.3b~10, 19

A reading from the first book of Samuel. Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.

Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" Samuel ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But Eli said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not vet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground.

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 40.1+3a, 6, 7-8, 9 (R.7-8) (R.) Here am I, Lord; I come to do your will.

- 1. I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry. He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God. (R.)

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 6.13c~15a. 17~20

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians. Your bodies are members of Christ.

The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel

John 1.35-42

A reading from the holy gospel according to John.

The disciples of John came and saw where Jesus was staying, and they remained with him.

John was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi", "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah". He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

Gospel Reflection:

Jesus' invitation to 'Come and See' is a powerful image in this week's gospel. It is not a simple reply to the question of where Jesus is living; in some ways it is a summary of his whole ministry – come and see what I am on about and become part of it. It is typical of the invitational nature of Jesus' ministry. Throughout the gospels, Jesus offers and invites, he does not force his ministry onto anyone. When he invites us to 'Come and See' it is an invitation to 'give it a go'; take a chance; let go of what we know.

To 'Come and See' is exactly what Jesus invited the apostles to do. In this week's reading, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, takes up the invitation and becomes a follower of Jesus. He is so impressed with what he sees in Jesus that he finds his brother and tells him that they've found the Messiah and that Simon should come and join them. Jesus immediately gives Simon a new nickname: the Rock (Peter). There are many instances throughout the Bible of people taking or being given new names. Abram became Abraham; Jacob became Israel; Saul became Paul. This change of name is used as a sign that they have encountered God in a special way and have taken on a new life – a new commitment to God. In this instance, Simon is becoming a disciple of Jesus, a trusted and influential one at that.

Unlike the call of Samuel in today's first reading, in which the call to discipleship is heard as a booming voice, Andrew and Simon experience the call through personal encounter with Jesus. A booming voice from the sky might be helpful, but for most of us the call comes in much more subtle ways through our prayer and reflection on interaction with others. © Greg Sunter

Twednesday 17 January - Saint Antony

St Antony is the originator of the monastic life. He went out into the wilderness to begin a life of penitence, living in absolute poverty. He lived to be over a hundred years old.

† Wednesday 24 January - Saint Francis de Sales

He was born near Annecy, in Savoy, studied the law, and was ordained to the priesthood despite the opposition of his father. St Francis is the patron saint of writers and journalists.

† Thursday 25 January - The Conversation of St Paul

Today's feast celebrates the day that Christ appeared to him Saul in a vision as he was on the way to Damascus, reproached him for his persecutions and converted him to the true faith.

† Friday 26 January ~ Australia Day

Grant, we pray, O lord our God, that as the Cross shines in our southern skies, so may Christ bring light to our nation. Bring a light breakfast and join Fr Michael following Mass upstairs in the Parish Centre.

† Wednesday 31 January - Saint John Bosco

He became a priest, and devoted himself to the care of the young, to ensure the continuation of his work, he founded a congregation, which he named after St Francis de Sales (a saint for whom he had great admiration), and today the Salesians continue his work all over the world.

† Friday 2 February ~ The Presentation of the Lord

We humbly implore your majesty that, just as your Only Begotten Son was presented on this day in the Temple in the substance of our flesh, so, by your grace, we may be presented to you with minds made pure.

† Friday 2 February - Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life

The Holy See World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life is celebrated on the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord The Feast Day was chosen by Pope John Paul II.

† Sat 3 | Sun 4 February ~ Word of God Sunday

Celebrated in Australia in February the Pope has chosen the motto taken from the Gospel of St John: "Remain in my Word" (John 8:31). This is also Catechist Sunday.

† Monday 5 February - Saint Agatha

She was martyred at Catania in Sicily, probably during the persecution of Decius (250-253). Devotion to her was widespread in the Church in the earliest times and she is mentioned in the Roman Canon of the Mass.

† Tuesday 6 February - Saint Paul Miki and Companions


A Jesuit Brother and native of Japan, Saint Paul Miki was crucified, along with 25 other Catholics, for preaching his belief in Jesus.

† Saturday 10 February - Saint Scholastica

The twin sister of St Benedict. She was dedicated to God from an early age and followed her brother to Cassino, where she died in about 547.

In memory during the Holidays

During the holidays, we remember the loved ones who will not be with us this year, our parishioners and family members who have passed. They are in our hearts as we come together to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Even though they are not with us physically, we know that they are held in the loving mercy of God. Because of our faith we know they are celebrating with all the angels and saints in heaven.

The liturgy of the word is a decisive element in the celebration of each one of the sacraments of the Church; in pastoral practice, however, the faithful are not always conscious of this connection, nor do they appreciate the unity between gesture and word. The relationship between word and sacramental gesture is the liturgical expression of God's activity in the history of salvation through the performative character of the word itself. In salvation history there is no separation between what God says and what he does. His word appears as alive and active (Heb 4:12), as the Hebrew term dabar itself makes clear. In the liturgical action too, we encounter his word which accomplishes what it says. By educating the People of God to discover the performative character of God's word in liturgy, we will help them to recognise his activity in salvation history and in their individual lives.
