

MESSAGE FROM FR MICHAEL:

A friend of mine became very sick with a heart condition which resulted in his heart not being able to pump enough blood around his body for him to survive. His pericardium (the sack of fluid the heart sits in) had become hardened and the heart could not work to its maximin. He had to have the pericardium removed (peeled like an orange) and he recovered after months of rest and exercise. The psalm today reminds us to not harden our hearts to the Word of God. To be open to the healing presence of God in our lives.

The man with the unclean spirit recognises Jesus as the "Holy One of God". Do we recognise the presence of God in our lives and receive his healing touch? Jesus teaches with authority. We need to say to Jesus "what do you want with us?" Jesus comes to heal, liberate, and strengthen. He truly is the prophet of God in his words and actions. Jesus is faithful to the Fathers will, he became man and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory.

I have had the privilege of visiting Capernaum and seen the floor of the excavated site of this Synagogue where this Sundays Gospel incident took place. In the Catholic Rite of Baptism all those to be Baptised are exorcised, they are prayed over and anointed with the oil, on the chest of the Catechumens (those preparing for Baptism), the Holy Spirit is evoked, praying that God would protect and strengthen them against all evil. May God protect and strengthen us all in our prophetic witness as members of the Kingdom of God.

First Reading

Deuteronomy 18.15-20

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy.

I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet.

Moses spoke to the people; he said: "The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: 'If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die.' Then the Lord replied to me: They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak, that prophet shall die.

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 95.1-2, 6-7ab, 7c-9 (R.7c+8a) (R.) If today you hear God's voice, harden not your hearts

- 1. O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! (R.)
- **2.** O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker! For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand. (R.)
- **3.** O that today you would listen to his voice! Do not harden your hearts, as at Meribah, as on the day at Massah in the wilderness, when your ancestors tested me, and put me to the proof, though they had seen my work. (R.)



Second Reading

1 Corinthians 7.17, 32~35++

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians. The unmarried are concerned about the affairs of the Lord.

Brothers and sisters, let each of you lead the life that the Lord has assigned, to which God has called you. I want you to be free from anxieties. The unmarried man is anxious about the affairs of the Lord, how to please the Lord; but the married man is anxious about the affairs of the world, how to please his wife, and his interests are divided. The unmarried woman and the virgin are concerned about the affairs of the Lord, so that they may be holy in body and spirit; but the married woman is concerned about the affairs of the world, how to please her husband. I say this for your own benefit, not to put any restraint upon you, but to promote good order and unhindered devotion to the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation

Matthew 4.16

Alleluia, alleluia!

A people in darkness have seen a great light; a radiant dawn shines on those lost in death. *Alleluia*.

Gospel Mark 1.21-28

A reading from the holy gospel according to Mark. They were all amazed: A new teaching - with authority.

The disciples went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, Jesus entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing the man and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching, with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once Jesus' fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

GOSPEL REFLECTION:

According to Pope Francis, 'Jesus did not mince words'. Any way you look at it, Christ's proclamation was a turning point in history with phenomenal ramifications. The moment has arrived! The Kingdom of God is close! There is Good News to be heard!

This was Jesus' message about himself. 'He was the salvation,' the Pope notes, who entered human history in a powerfully new way.

When we look at this Gospel, Jesus also had another component of his message: the way of discipleship. Its elements are straightforward: repent, believe, follow. As the Pope elaborates, Jesus 'invites us to recognise ourselves as in need of God and his grace; to have a balanced attitude with regard to earthly goods; to be welcoming and humble toward everyone; to know and fulfil ourselves in the encounter with and service of others.' This is how we can change our lives to follow more closely the one in whom we believe.

And, as the Pope further suggests, each phase of our life 'has its own value, and can be a privileged moment of encounter with the Lord.' Therefore, we should be open to welcoming Jesus again and again in new places and situations. Whether in our parishes, homes or workplaces, our lives are full of encounters that can change us and those we meet.
