MESSAGE FROM FR MICHAEL

The book of Job (7.1-4, 6-7) in the first reading today is clinically depressed. He finds no joy in life at all and is very sad. Contrast that reading with the psalm that follows it and the Gospel story of healing and restoration. It is the Lord who heals the brokenhearted, binds up wounds, sustains the lowly and chases away evil and affliction.

The words used to describe the healing and 'raising up' of Peter's mother-in-law are used to describe the resurrection of Jesus from the dead and the new life people have in Christ Jesus. He is the one who brings healing and new life. He conquers sickness and death, evil in all forms, finally restoring people to the dignity of their role and work. We see this in the healing of Peter's mother-in-law as she begins to serve after her recovery.

We see Jesus at prayer early in the morning communing with the Father, but his disciples 'hunt him down', this is an interpretation or translation of the words 'pursue him'. Jesus is about the preaching or proclaiming of the good news and so continues his work in the synagogues of Galilee. May his words and actions bring us healing and help us to be heralds of the 'Good News'.

Like a slave who longs for the shadow, and like labourers who look for their wages, so I am allotted months of emptiness, and nights of misery are apportioned to me. "When I lie down I say, 'When shall I rise?' But the night is long, and I am full of tossing until dawn. "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle, and come to their end without hope. Remember that my life is a breath; my eye will never again see good."

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 147.1-2, 3-4, 5-6 (R.1a, 3) (R.) Praise the Lord, who heals the brokenhearted.

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 9.16-19, 22-23

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians. Woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel!

If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel. For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings.

Alleluia, alleluia! Christ bore our sickness, and endured our suffering. Alleluia.




Gospel

Mark 1.29~39

A reading from the holy gospel according to Mark. Jesus cured many who were sick with various diseases.

As soon as Jesus and his disciples left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told Jesus about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them. That evening, at sundown, they brought to Jesus all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him. In the morning, while it was still very dark, Jesus got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." He answered, "Let us go on to the neighbouring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." And Jesus went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Pope Francis has opened the Year of Prayer



On the fifth annual celebration of the 'Sunday of the Word of God', the Holy Father Pope Francis officially opened the Year of Prayer during the recitation of the Angelus.

The Pope said:


"Dear brothers and sisters, the next few months will lead us to the opening of the Holy Door, with which we will begin the Jubilee. I ask you to intensify your prayer to prepare us to live this event of grace well and experience the strength of God's hope. Today we begin the Year of Prayer, that is, a year dedicated to rediscovering the great value and the absolute need for prayer in personal life, in the life of the Church and of the world."

To fully experience this period of preparation for the 2025 Jubilee, added the Pontiff, "we will also be helped by the materials that the Dicastery for Evangelization will make available". In the next few days the first of the eight volumes of the "Notes on Prayer" series will be published by the Dicastery, published by LEV. The introductory book, entitled "Praying today. A challenge" is by Cardinal Angelo Comastri. "Notes on Prayer"- which will be provided to the community to help them to take advantage the coming months.

The Year of Prayer will be dedicated to rediscovering, as Pope Francis underlined, "the great value and absolute need of prayer, in personal life, in the life of the Church, and prayer in the world", in preparation for the 2025 Jubilee.

The year will conclude, in December 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door marking the beginning of the Holy Year. The Holy Father officially opened the Year of Prayer during the Angelus on January 21, saying: "I ask you to intensify your prayer to prepare us to live this event of grace well and experience the strength of God's hope."

Guest Speaker: Most Rev Vincent Long Van Nguyen OFM Conv "Synodality"

Bishop Vincent Long was born in 1961 in Dong Nai in Vietnam. In 1989 he was ordained to the

priesthood as a Conventual Franciscan friar and then studied in Rome and was awarded a licentiate in Christology and Spirituality from the Pontifical Faculty of St Bonaventure. He served as assistant and parish priest in the Diocese of Parramatta and as Assistant General in Rome from 2008 until 2011 responsible for the Asia-Oceania section of his Order. In 2011 he was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Melbourne and in 2016 was appointed the fourth Bishop of Parramatta. Nationally, he serves as the Bishops Delegate for Migrants and Refugees and is Chair of Australian Catholic Social Justice Council. Bishop Vincent is the first Vietnamese born bishop to lead a diocese outside of Vietnam and the first Vietnamese born bishop in Australia.



The Living Word

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

4 February 2024

Gospel Reflection: This week's gospel follows directly on from last week's reading and, as is typical with Mark's gospel, the events occur on the very same day. The urgency of the gospel is obvious in this week's reading; Jesus had a very busy 24 hours! Having launched his public ministry in the synagogue earlier that day, Jesus accompanies his new disciples to meet some of their family and have a meal. However, on arriving at the home of Simon and Andrew, they find Simon's mother-in-law is sick. Unlike the public displays of his healing power that preceded and will follow this episode, Jesus does not say anything but simply takes the woman by the hand and helps her up. Her response of beginning to wait on Jesus and his disciples is a faith response and a recognition of who Jesus is. A theme that runs through this gospel is that the disciples never fully understand who Jesus is. Here, a woman who has just met him recognises him as the Messiah and begins to serve him.

Still on the same day, we see the expansion of Jesus' healing ministry. On this one day he has cast an unclean spirit out of a possessed man in the synagogue, healed Peter's mother-in-law of a fever and then healed the crowds of people who came to the door. The next morning he announces that they will take the ministry to the whole region of Galilee. In a very simple way, the gospel of Mark has described the growth of Jesus' ministry from very humble isolated examples to a deliberate reaching out to the people of an entire region.

Historical Context – Capernaum: Jesus appears to have made Capernaum his base after leaving Nazareth. He may, in fact, have based himself at Simon Peter's house. There are many references in the gospels to Jesus' actions in Capernaum. Archaeologists have identified the house in Capernaum that they believe to be Simon Peter's house – less than 100 metres from the Capernaum synagogue. Evidence reveals carved inscriptions and symbols that identify both Jesus and Peter. The house appears to have been used as a 'house-church' until a church was built on the site in the 5th Century. Excavations of the site can be seen today.

Have you thought? Simon's Wife? In this week's reading, it is Simon's mother-in-law who is healed. This obviously means that Simon is married. However, there is no mention whatsoever about his wife. Is she alive or dead? Do they have children? We have no indication. It is not until the writings of Paul (1 Cor 9:5) that we learn Simon Peter was indeed married and that his wife accompanied him on his travels. Perhaps this visit to his family home was to announce to his wife and family that he had decided to follow Jesus and give up fishing.

Living the Gospel – Prayer: In the midst of an extremely hectic 24 hours where Jesus effectively launches his public ministry, Jesus takes time to go aside to a lonely place and pray. The passage tells us that it was 'long before dawn' that he did this. It may have been his usual practice to pray early in the morning or he may have been restless after the events of the previous day and the thought of what lay ahead. Nevertheless, Jesus provides us with a model of using prayer to reflect on events and to prepare ourselves for the day ahead.

Launch of local and national Synod consultation



Catholics around Australia are being asked to contribute to a global discussion on the future of the Church. At a local (diocesan) level, consultation contributing to the next session of the General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops will start on February 1.

Groups of Catholics will gather and reflect on the question of "enhancing the differentiated co-responsibility in the mission of all members" and provide feedback. The discussion will focus on identifying the paths to follow and the tools that could be adopted in different contexts and circumstances to enhance the unique contribution of each baptised person.

The dioceses will then report their findings. Dioceses are also encouraged to provide a two-page testimony of their experiences of synodality, including any best practices that they consider significant. As well, Catholics will be encouraged to promote new initiatives which will help to grow as a synodal church on mission.

"This work does not require restarting the synodal process again in dioceses but rather it is built upon the outcomes of the synodal experiences from previous stages of consultation," said Australian Catholic Bishops Conference president, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe.

National Centre for Pastoral Research Director Dr Trudy Dantis said: "In responding to the questions, dioceses and groups are invited to focus on the 'how' and to choose aspects that enable them to make contributions based on their own situation, character and experience."

Catholic leaders will also reflect at a national level on the question of the "differentiated co-responsibility", particularly on the relations between Churches, between groupings of Churches at different levels and with the Bishop of Rome.

Diocesan contacts and Synod group leaders will receive training in February, led by the National Centre for Pastoral Research, and an online submission portal will be set up in late March to collate feedback from dioceses. A synthesis report of the diocesan and national reflections and a collation of diocesan testimonies will be sent to the Vatican by May 15.

The next session of the Synod - which was initially held from October 4-29, 2023 - will be staged in October in the Vatican.






