

MESSAGE FROM FR MICHAEL: On this 'Rejoice Sunday' in the midst of Lent we are reminded that Lent is a journey into the light. The scriptures today reflect on the experience of the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, the deportation of the people to Babylon and their longing to return home to Jerusalem. Lent for us is a journey within our home in the love of God.

Nicodemus was a man who was interested in Jesus and wanted to know more about him and his teaching. He would come to Jesus under the cover of darkness because he was a public figure and did not want to be seen with Jesus. Jesus challenges him and us to come out into the light because Jesus is that light who has come into the world that all might be saved and have eternal life.

Our journey of Lent is towards God and challenges us to let go of the darkness and to live the truth in the light of God's presence. God wants all to be saved and to have eternal life. When we were Baptised, we received a candle symbolising the enlightenment we have in Christ. The instruction that goes with the candle enjoins the newly Baptised to "Walk always as a child of the light and when the Lord comes go out to meet him with all the saints in the heavenly kingdom." Let us prepare well for our Easter Renewal of our Baptismal Promises and bear the light of the Lord in a world that needs people of faith and hope.



All the leading priests and the people were exceedingly unfaithful, following all the abominations of the nations; and they polluted the house of the Lord that he had consecrated in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, persistently sent his messengers to them, because he had compassion on his people and on his dwelling place; but they kept mocking the messengers of God, despising his words, and scoffing at his prophets, until the wrath of the Lord against his people became so great that there was no remedy. Therefore the Lord brought up against them the king of the Chaldeans, who burned the house of God, broke down the wall of Jerusalem, burned all its palaces with fire, and destroyed all its precious vessels. The king took into exile in Babylon those who had escaped from the sword, and they became servants to him and to his sons until the establishment of the kingdom of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord by the mouth of Jeremiah, until the land had made up for its sabbaths. All the days that it lay desolate it kept sabbath, to fulfil seventy years. In the first year of King Cyrus of Persia, in fulfilment of the word of the Lord spoken by Jeremiah, the Lord stirred up the spirit of King Cyrus of Persia so that he sent a herald throughout all his kingdom and also declared in a written edict: "Thus says King Cyrus of Persia: The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth, and he has charged me to build him a house at Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever is among you of all his people, may the Lord his God be with him! Let him go up.'

PROJECT COMPASSION FOR ALL FUTURE GENERATIONS

We have all lived through a great deal of change. Even young people have seen plenty. ChatGPT is a recent development and so are electric cars. Older people can remember having a phone plugged into a socket that you couldn't carry around with you. Sometimes we have discussions about the good old days. They are often tinged with nostalgia for things we miss and gratitude for improvements. We no longer need to buy film for our cameras or change typewriter ribbons. Climate change is deeply troubling. Many medical improvements are inspiring.

Change can certainly be frightening. It can also be an occasion of great hope. Jesus seems to have understood this. Nicodemus comes across as a character who is looking for change in his life, but he is nervous about it, so he comes to see Jesus under cover of darkness. Earlier in the chapter, Jesus uses the image of being born again. Of starting all over again. It is a dramatic description of change. Jesus says that the light has come into the world and that people prefer the same old darkness. They are set in their ways. Every Lent, through Project Compassion, Caritas Australia asks us to help bring light into the world and to make positive change. An example is presented to us this week in the story of Memory, a young woman from rural Malawi, the eldest child in a family living at the level of subsistence farming. Listen to some of Memory's words: 'Growing up in the village was

Listen to some of Memory's words: 'Growing up in the village was not easy. My parents don't have a job, so they depend on farming. When the season goes wrong, we suffer a lot and become food insecure. Sometimes we need to bathe without soap. Sometimes we need to walk without shoes.'

With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner the Catholic Development Commission in Malawi (CADECOM), Memory was able to enrol at a technical college where she learnt practical skills in carpentry. A new life became possible. She can now realise her full potential and offer more to her family and her community. Today, the letter to the Ephesians reminds us that every person is 'God's work of art.' God is the artist who never signs off on a painting but is always trying to make it better. Nicodemus: A Journey of Faith in the Gospel of John

For the 4th Sunday of Lent Year B, John 3 introduces Nicodemus, who visits Jesus at night, recognizing Him as a divine teacher due to His miracles. Jesus tells him about the necessity of being "born again" to see God's kingdom, explaining it as a spiritual rebirth beyond the physical. This conversation, including the analogy of Moses and the serpent, foreshadows Jesus' crucifixion and the salvation it offers. Jesus emphasizes belief in Him as essential for eternal life and warns of judgment on disbelief. This passage highlights the transformative concept of rebirth through the Spirit and the pivotal role of faith in salvation. @young-catholics

Pope to children: Changing the world starts with 'please' and 'thank you' and prayer.

Pope Francis sends a message to all the children of the world to encourage them to be united and listen to advice from grown-ups because, he says, their "pleases" and "thank yous" are the first step towards a better world. In his message, Pope Francis writes that he wants to speak to "each" of them because each individual is precious. At the same time, he continues, the message is addressed to "all" of them, because all children, everywhere, "are a sign of every person's desire to grow and flourish".

The Holy Father goes on to remind the children they are a source of joy for their parents and families "but also for our human family and for the Church" in which

we are all connected. For this reason, the Pope encourages the children to pay attention to the stories grown-ups tell them.

Pope Francis then discloses what he describes as a "secret" to the children: the secret of prayer. He says that "prayer fills our hearts with light and warmth" and invites the children to pray to the Father just as Jesus did. In his language, Jesus called the Father 'Abba', which means 'Daddy'. Let's do the same thing, says the Pope, adding that in this way we will always feel Jesus close to us.



The Living Word

Fourth Sunday of Lent, Year B

10 March 2024

Gospel Reflection: To fully understand this week's gospel passage, it is important to take the first reading into consideration as well. The account from 2 Chronicles describes the way in which the people began to neglect their relationship with God. Despite prophets and messengers being sent to them, they turned their backs on God. At about this time the Israelites were conquered, the Temple in Jerusalem destroyed and the survivors taken into exile in Babylon. For many, this was seen as a punishment from God because of their neglectful and selfish behaviour. But the reading demonstrates God's infinite patience with humankind. God gives the people another chance and calls on them to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem. God is willing to wipe the slate clean and start afresh. It is in this context that we must understand the gospel passage. In yet another attempt to demonstrate love and forgiveness, God's only Son the Word made Flesh is sent into the world to lead the people from darkness to light. Despite the many, many attempts by God to demonstrate love and foster a relationship with humankind, the people have repeatedly rejected the relationship with God and preferred to live a life of selfishness and darkness. Yet we see through both of these readings the unquenchable nature of God who keeps giving humankind one more chance.

In our day to day relationships, it is true that we often seek to test the limits of the love that is expressed. Young people in particular often test the boundaries of their parents' love and the boundaries of others who care for them. It is often a test to reassure themselves of this love – will you still love me, even if I do this? Today's readings portray the people of God as adolescents constantly testing out the limits of God's love. In a remarkable act, God's own Son is sent into the world to die as a sign of the lengths to which God will go to assure humanity of the love that is theirs for the taking.

Have you thought? God in popular culture: Think for a moment of the last time you saw or heard a reference to God on a television program, in a song, or some other popular medium. Chances are, the reference was one of a judging, vengeful, punishing God. This sort of image plays particularly well with a modern audience. It's easier to dismiss God as irrelevant if we can paint God in that sort of image. TV sitcoms do it particularly well with thunderclaps, bolts of lightning and booming, disapproving voices from above. It's much harder to dismiss a God of love who will go to extremes to demonstrate that love.

Gospel Focus – Not to condemn: The gospel passage tells us that God's Son was not sent into the world to condemn it, but rather, 'so that through him the world might be saved'. It also tells us that whoever refuses to believe 'is already condemned'. God does not condemn the world, nor individuals within it. Indeed, God is absolutely determined to save the world. However, we do sometimes condemn ourselves. When we turn our back on love; when we hide from relationships; when we wallow in selfishness we shut ourselves off from relationship with God and condemn ourselves. We only have to open our eyes to see the alternative!

Historical Context - Babylonian Exile: In the book of Leviticus (25:4), it is commanded that every seventh year, the land was to be allowed to have a 'Sabbath year' - no tilling soil, no planting, no harvesting. The people failed to observe this command and the prophet, Jeremiah, interprets the destruction of the Temple and exile into Babylon as God's opportunity to enforce the period of Sabbath rest for the land. The people were in exile in Babylon for 70 years, ending about 537 BCE when the Persian emperor, Cyrus, conquered the Babylonians and agreed to return the Israelites to their land. He also returned to them all of the treasures looted from the Temple so that it may be rebuilt.

- Q. Why were the Israelites so ready to see their Babylonian exile as God's punishment of them?
- Q. What other Biblical examples do you know of where God forgave and gave people another chance?
- Q. Why do people continue to test the boundaries of love in relationships?




Memory is 26 years old and lives in rural Malawi. As the eldest child in a low-income farming family, Memory had to take on many household chores and farming activities to support her parents. They struggled to pay for Memory's school fees and school supplies, and Memory often had to walk to school barefooted.

With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner the Catholic Development Commission in Malawi (CADECOM), Memory was able to enrol at a technical college where she learnt technical skills in carpentry. She undertook a three-year carpentry course, with CADECOM supporting part of her tuition and boarding fees.

Memory became the first female carpenter from her village. Today, she works as a carpenter at one of Malawi's largest hydroelectric power stations. With the income from her job, she can provide financial support to her family and inspire other young women in her community so that they may have the opportunity to succeed in a male-dominated industry.




