

A TRIUMPHANT ENTRY INTO HOLY WEEK!

We enter Holy Week with Jesus as he enters Jerusalem to a tumultuous welcome from the crowds which by the end of the week turns to betrayal and death. With prayer and vigil on Good Friday and Holy Saturday we await the joy and hope we find in Easter. To make this time prayerful and renewing I invite you to attend the opportunity for the Sacrament of Penance (Confession, Reconciliation) on Tuesday evening at 7pm with several priests available for the celebration of this Sacrament.

Thursday evening, we celebrate the Mass of the Last Supper with a procession to the Altar of repose and the church will be open for prayer until midnight. Jesus said to his disciple "Could you not wait with me one hour?" On Good Friday we have Morning Prayer of the Church followed by Stations of the Cross which is great preparation for the afternoon Celebration of the Lords Passion which encompasses the Liturgy of the Word, Prayer, Adoration of the Cross and Holy Communion.

On Holy Saturday, Morning Prayer of the Church is celebrated with the blessing of Easter Foods and the preparation of the Church for Easter. The Easter Vigil begins with the fire outside, the Blessing and lighting of the new Easter Candle with a Procession into the darkened church and the proclamation of Easter followed by the Liturgy of the Word, Renewal of our Baptismal vows, and the celebration of the Eucharist. Easter Sunday Masses are celebrated in the morning with no evening Mass.

At the beginning of Holy Week, I invite you to take a 'word' or phrase from the scriptures or prayers and to pray with this throughout the week and at Easter to again choose a word or phrase from the scriptures or prayers to accompany you into Eastertide.

I pray this holy time will help you on your Christian journey and inspire you in your discipleship of the Lord.



HOLY WEEK embraces the last days of Lent (until Thursday) and the Easter Triduum. The Sacrament of Penance is an excellent way to conclude the penitential season of Lent. It is best celebrated *before* Holy Thursday evening so that, with heart and mind renewed, all may focus on the celebration of the Paschal Mystery.

Let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be observed everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, as a way of coming to the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection with uplifted and welcoming hearts. *SC110*



THE SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM

HOLY SATURDAY BLESSING OF EASTER FOOD BASKETS

Baskets containing a sampling of Easter foods and eggs are brought to church to be blessed on Holy Saturday following Morning Prayer.

The tradition is said to date from the 7th century in its basic form, the more modern form containing bread and eggs (symbols of resurrection and Christ) are said to date from the 12th century.

Bring your basket to Holy Saturday Morning Prayer 9:30am for a blessing.

The Church is enriched greatly by a description of a palm procession written by a 4th Century pilgrim named Egeria.

Egeria, who was probably from France or Spain, wrote a detailed account of her travels to the Holy Land.

Only fragments of her letters or diary were recovered from transcriptions which were discovered many centuries later.

Apart from being a valuable historic source, her great powers of observation make her 'travel diaries' a wonderful read.

The first English translation of the transcriptions was published late in the 19th Century.

Egeria describes the Great Week activities in Jerusalem. She highlights a procession that re-enacts Christ's triumphant entry in to Jerusalem and describes the reading of the Gospel, people singing hymns and antiphons and children being carried on shoulders waving palms and olive branches as they go on foot to the Mount of Olives. She notes that the procession covered some distance so the speed was deliberately slow to avoid anyone becoming weary.


The whole event concluded with a service of light in the evening.

While this account relates to a 4th Century Jerusalem custom, the palm procession was not actually incorporated into the liturgy of the Roman Rite until about the 11th and 12th Centuries.

Palm Sunday ~ The History (first known as Pasha) originated in the Jerusalem Church around the late third or early fourth century. Ceremonies consisted of prayers, hymns, and sermons as people moved through the numerous holy sites within the city. At the last site, the place of Jesus' ascension into heaven, the clergy would read the biblical account of Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem. Then as evening approached, the people would return to the city reciting: "Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord" (Matthew 21:9). By the fifth century, the celebration had spread as far as Constantinople. It wasn't until the sixth and seventh centuries that the ritual blessing of the palms was added. A morning procession replaced the evening one and by the eighth century, the Western Church was celebrating "Dominica in Palmis" or "Palm Sunday.

What is the seven churches visitation?

The Seven Churches Visitation is a centuries old Roman Catholic tradition, in which the faithful visit seven churches on the evening of Holy Thursday. This pilgrimage is thought to have originated in Rome, where pilgrims would visit the Holy Year Basilicas as an act of penance and prayer. Saint Philip Neri popularised this practice, gathering people together before dawn to make a visit to all seven of these Pilgrimage Churches in the same day, stopping at each for a period of prayer, song and reflection.

Over time, the tradition of the Seven Churches Visitation travelled beyond the walls of Rome and is now undertaken by Catholics all over the world. The pilgrimage can take place between any seven churches, beginning in the church in which we attend the Mass of the Lord's Supper. At all the churches along the way, we stop to pray with Our Lord, truly present to us at each Altar of Repose. By partaking in the Seven Churches Visitation, we keep vigil with Jesus, joining him in his prayers to the Father in the Garden of Gethsemane.

How do you do it?

The only requirement for the Seven Churches Visitation is to spend time in prayer at and between any seven churches. Many participants pray the Stations of the Cross as they walk between each church. Some recite the Rosary and sing hymns and sacred songs. The pilgrimage is "tailor-made" according to the time, distance, and capacities of the many diverse individuals, families or groups who take part in it.



The Living Word

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, Year B

24 March 2024

Gospel Reflection: By the time the gospel accounts came to be written, it was more than 35 years after the death of Jesus. The Gospel of Mark is now very widely held to have been the first of the four gospels, written in about the year 70 CE. One of the reasons for the writing of the gospels was the fact that those who had walked and talked with Jesus were becoming old and dying. There was a sense of capturing the story before the last eye witnesses were gone. This is very evident in the Passion narrative from the gospel of Mark. One can almost hear an elderly voice dictating the events: 'then this happened ...; then he said ...; then we all thought ...' Like so much of this particular gospel, there is very little embellishment. It's like an old time detective show, 'Just give us the facts!' The gospel of Mark presents the story of the Passion as a sequence of events with little commentary or theological reflection. (That is partly why it lends itself so well to being read by several voices.)

One of the best examples that the gospel is a straightforward recollection of events is the inclusion of the scene in Gethsemane when the young man ran away naked. No storyteller would create such a bizarre, unexplained event. There is no explanation of who the young man is, why he was wearing only a loincloth, nor why the armed men tried to seize hold of him. It is reported in exactly the same style as the rest of the story, very matter-of-fact. The presence of the young man, both in Gethsemane and in the gospel, has puzzled scholars for many years, yet if nothing else, it provides evidence of the way in which this Passion narrative was transmitted from lived experience, to memory, to oral account, to written gospel.

Gospel Focus ~ This man was a son of God: By the time we have stood and listened to this lengthy Passion narrative, the listener may have started to wilt by the time we get to the death of Jesus. Yet the gospel writer keeps one of the most important messages for this moment. As Jesus dies, a centurion standing by utters the inspired words, 'In truth, this man was a son of God.' Famously played by John Wayne in the movie, The Greatest Story Ever Told, the centurion is the voice of the gentile, the non-Jew, representing all those throughout the world who will recognise the truth of Jesus' life and purpose.

Have you thought? Passion of the Passion: The Passion narrative is very aptly named. The emotion and power of this story is nothing short of passionate. The gospel writer's style of fast paced, unadorned factual narrative is a very effective way of helping the reader/listener to engage in the story. It is, after all, the first half of the most important Christian story, finished off by the resurrection that is celebrated on Easter Sunday. It is easy to see why this stark, narrative style was embellished and expanded upon by the later gospel writers and yet it is perhaps the more passionate for the lack of explanation and theologising.

Living the Gospel - Before the cock crows: Peter is an interesting character in the gospels. He is one of the first of the disciples to be called; Jesus changes his name and places great trust in him; he is witness to the most significant moments of Jesus' life; he is able to profess his faith in Jesus as the Christ and yet it is he who denies even knowing Jesus. We might have thought that Peter was Jesus' most loyal and faithful follower, yet it is he who can't stand up and claim that he was a follower of Jesus. Is it any wonder that it is difficult for us today sometimes?

- Q. Why is it important that we continue to 'tell the story' of the Passion?
- Q. Which elements of this Passion narrative are challenging / confronting / surprising?
- Q. Which films or artworks depicting the Passion have you found to be inspiring?
- Q. How does Christ's Passion story reflect the reality of human existence?

Learning moments: Examine different depictions of the Stations of the Cross from diverse artists and cultures. What elements of the story are emphasised or highlighted by the different artists? Which styles of Stations of the Cross are appealing? Why? Which ones are confronting? 
